## Neck warmer/ Beanie

Designed by Clare Sullivan Video tutorial – USA terminology EASY

## Materials used:

2 strands of 8ply/Double Knit yarn for thickness and 4mm crochet hook **OR** 1 stand of worsted weight yarn and a 5.00mm hook Yarn needle Scissors

**Abbreviations:** ch = chain; hdc = half double crochet; sc = single crochet

Notes: 1) You could use a sc instead of hdc for this pattern. 2) The project may curl up in the beginning, but should flatten out as more rows are added. 3) Working through the back loops will create a ribbed effect.

- 1. Make a chain that will measure from the crown of your head down the side (to where you want the beanie to end). Optional Add about 2 extra inches to the chain to create the cuff.
- 2. Hdc in 2<sup>nd</sup> ch from hook and hdc in each remaining ch. Ch 2, turn.
- 3. Hdc into the back loop of the 2<sup>nd</sup> stitch. Repeat this in the back loop of each stitch across the row. The last hdc goes in the ch from the previous row. Ch 2, turn.
- 4. Repeat Row 2 until the piece is long enough to wrap around your head. Fasten off leaving about a 12 in tail.

Fold the piece, lining up the first & last rows. Using a tapestry needle & the 12in tail, sew through the back loops of the front piece & both loops of the back piece. Continue sewing across each stitch until the end of the row. Weave in the ends.

Fold up the cuff.

**Tie for top of beanie:** make a chain about 2ft long (about 60cm). Fasten off or leave it until you're sure of the length. You could also make an icord – instructions below.

Weave chain in/out of stitches all around the top of beanie using a crochet hook.

Take 2 ends of tie & pull to gather top of beanie. Tie how you'd like. Untie the top to slide down & wear as a neck warmer.

## **Icord instructions:**

Tip: to tighten the icord, pull up on 2<sup>nd</sup> loop on hook and then pull 3<sup>rd</sup> loop as you work.

- 1. Ch 3, go into 2<sup>nd</sup> ch from hook, pull up loop, go into 3<sup>rd</sup> ch, pull up loop.
- 2. Remove 1<sup>st</sup> two loops from hook and hold them. Ch 1, put next loop you're holding back on hook, ch 1, put last loop you're holding back on hook, ch 1 You should end up with 3 loops on your hook.
- 3. Repeat steps 2 until you reach the desired length.
- 4. Yarn over and pull through all 3 loops to fasten off. Weave in ends.
